

## Paying for College: Order of Operations

1st

Free money (such as scholarships or grants)Nearly free resources (such as CE/AP/IB or dual enrollment)



2<sup>nd</sup>

Earned money (such as work-study or other employment)
Saved money (such as a 529, credit union, or bank account)



3rd

Borrowed money (use federal student loans before private)

## Ways to Pay for College

### 1. Apply for Scholarships

• State scholarships, institutional scholarships, private scholarships

### 2. File the FAFSA

Grants, work-study, student loans

### 3. Earn

 Work-study, other employment, benefits from work such as tuition reduction or tuition reimbursement

### 4. Save

 Bank or credit union, 529 education savings account, other investment accounts, ABLE savings account (STABLE) for students with disabilities


### 5. Find other ways to cut costs

#### Who provides scholarships?

- State and local government
- · Technical colleges, community colleges, and universities
- . Community organizations, school districts, and K-12 schools
- Companies and corporations

#### **Getting Started**

#### 1. School counseling or guidance office

- Ask: "Who can I talk to about scholarships in high school?"
- Set up a time to meet and be prepared with questions
- · Apply to as many scholarships as possible

#### 2. Apply through your college or university

- Scholarships upon admission
  - o Many Utah colleges have automatic scholarship opportunities when students apply
  - Some colleges do have separate scholarship applications
- Departmental scholarships
- Leadership scholarships
- Private scholarships

#### 3. Explore employer-sponsored tuition

- Tuition reduction
  - o Employer benefits that provide reduced tuition
- Tuition reimbursement
  - Employer benefits that reimburse employees for
- Employee scholarships
- Both parents' or students' employers may offer this benefit

#### 4. Community scholarships

- Many community organizations and local businesses provide scholarship opportunities
- o Inquire at your credit union
- Check with local businesses Ask community organizations
- Local scholarships can increase chances of earning the award
- · Apply for small scholarships, too, \$250-1,000 scholarships can reduce out-of-pocket costs

#### 5. Online scholarship search

. An online search for scholarships can go a long way. Just be aware of scams and fraudulent applications. Never pay to apply for a scholarship. If a website looks sketchy, then just leave and move on to an official site.

#### 6. File the FAFSA

- · Although the FAFSA doesn't give scholarships, it may be required to qualify for scholarships.
- Commonly, scholarships requiring the FAFSA are based on need. However, that isn't always the case.
- An example would be the Opportunity Scholarship, which is



- Print handouts to share with families. They can take notes and bring them home






# **Classroom presentations or lessons**

- Print handouts for students
- Play videos to support teaching
- Work on activity sheets in class

## Workshops or family events:

- Host an event and share the first eight slides
- Show five individual presentations or activities
- Make handouts available in each breakout room
- Use the videos to help the presenters
- Volunteers to present will be easier to find with the toolkit





# Lunch activities or school news
