The Utah Scholars Initiative has gone through some exciting changes this past year and we are thrilled to share them with you in our 2015–2016 Annual Report. Inside this year's Annual Report we highlight: student experiences, our program reach, and new program changes.

Highlights:

- Students, parents, and counselors experienced our updated look and feel in rebranded materials and presentation. Utah Scholars now operates under the StepUp Utah umbrella and we collaborate with the social media team to help engage more students via Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and YouTube.
- We sent weekly text messages to over 1,200 high school seniors "calling them to action" on things they should be doing to make it through the college doors this fall.
- We expanded our Utah Scholars 10th grade program to include 9th—12th grades. Students in select high schools can now join the Utah Scholars Club, where they can participate in activities that will help them be more prepared for college.

The Utah Scholars Initiative would not be possible without the support of our volunteers, school counselors, teachers, and administrators. A big THANK YOU to everyone who comes together each year to help our Utah students be more prepared for college.

ABOUT UTAH SCHOLARS

The Utah Scholars Initiative (USI) is a high impact academic program intended to motivate students to complete a **defined curriculum** while in high school to better prepare them for college and future employment. We focus on helping students understand the **academic preparation** needed to succeed in post-secondary education and in the workforce.

Students hear about Utah Scholars through 8th grade presentations given by volunteers from local businesses, communities, and education leaders.

Our volunteers emphasize:

Why getting a college education is important

What they can do now to prepare for college

How to pay for college



When a student is a Utah Scholar, they will:

- Qualify for more scholarships
- Be more competitive in college admissions
- Be academically ready for college courses
- Receive a Utah Scholars Initiative completion certificate and medallion to wear at high school graduation
- Receive the StepUp Utah monthly newsletter which covers topics such as college preparation, college resources, scholarships, financial aid and tips to stay on-track for college
- Receive text messages with college prep advice throughout the senior year of high school and receive personal replies to their questions

USI CURRICULUM

The Utah Scholars curriculum encourages students to "take the right classes" in order to help them be more prepared for college. These courses are based on national recommendations that ensure students are prepared for life beyond high school. By taking these classes, students have a stronger foundation to be more competitive on scholarship and college admissions applications. We encourage students to:

Step 1: Sign Up

Sign up now at utahscholars.org and take the first step to college!

Step 2: Take the Right Classes

4 Credits of English

Includes: Language Art 9,10,11,12, or Honors Language Arts, IB Language A, AP English Language, ENGL 1010 and 2010, if taken as concurrent enrollment.

4 Credits of Math

Includes: Math I, II, III, IB Math, AP Calculus, AP Statistics, Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2. Students must take one class beyond Math III.

3.5 Credits of Social Science

Includes: geography, world and U.S. history, economics, government, and AP/IB versions of those courses.

3 Credits of a Lab-Based Science

Must take each of the following: biology, chemistry, and physics. Students taking concurrent enrollment must complete both a college lecture and a college lab. A college "lecture" combined with a high school "lab" is not sufficient.

2 Credits of a World Language

Must be the same world/classical language taken progressively in grades 9-12. Includes American Sign Language, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Russian, Spanish. AP and IB versions of these courses.

Step 3: Stay on Track

Utah Scholars need a 3.0 GPA and no grade lower than a "C" in the core classes (that means no "C-"). In 11th grade, take the ACT. This test helps colleges know that you are ready for college-level work. Any score on the ACT can qualify you to be a Utah Scholar.

Step 4: Launch Into College!





Senior Text Messaging Pilot

Many students know that they want to attend college but many don't know what's involved to get there. In an effort to be more accessible to students, we piloted a "senior texting campaign" through Signal Vine, a two-way text messaging platform. Students receive weekly texts prompting them to do various college preparation tasks such as filing a FAFSA or meeting with their school counselor to make sure they're on track for college. If students need additional help, we are there to answer their questions or direct them to the appropriate resource.



Campus Tour

The Utah Scholars Club is an after school college prep club that students can join at Hunter and Granger High Schools. This club is open to any student who has an interest and a desire to go to college. The Club uses a "near peer" model with college students acting as mentors to high school students. Each week they meet to learn about the ins and outs of what it takes to get to college. Many of the students are the first people in their family to



go to college and have many questions and concerns about the unknown. As part of the Utah Scholars Club, students had the opportunity to visit a college campus. This year the students selected Utah Valley University (UVU) and were able to meet with a college student on campus to talk to him about what it is like to attend UVU.

New and Improved Monthly Newsletter

When students sign up to be a Utah Scholar they receive the monthly StepUp Newsletter. The newsletter includes short essays and personal statements from actual high school and college students on their college prep experiences. They also receive valuable information about paying for college and tips from financial aid experts. A monthly scholarship opportunity is included along with a tip of the month and a "Did you know?" section.




REGENTS' SCHOLARSHIP

Our sister program, the Regent's Scholarship, provides a scholarship of up to \$6,400 over two years to students who qualify. Students who successfully complete the Utah Scholars curriculum will have met the course requirements to apply for the scholarship. Over 4,000 Utah seniors applied for the scholarships this year, the majority of who came from Utah Scholars partner schools.

The Regents' Scholarship offers three awards. A student can earn a combination of awards: the Base Award, Base & UESP, Base & Exemplary, or Base, Exemplary & UESP awards.

BASE AWARD

- \$1,000 one-time award
- Complete the USI Curriculum
- Earn a "C" or higher in each of the core classes
- Earn a 3,0 cumulative GPA
- Submit an ACT score

EXEMPLARY AWARD


- In 2015, \$1,250 per semester. May be renewed for four semesters
- Complete the USI Curriculum
- Earn a "B" or high in each of the core classes
- Earn a 3.5 cumulative GPA
- Earn a 26 or higher Act score

UESP (UTAH EDUCATIONAL SAVINGS PLAN) AWARD

- Up to \$400 match
- Meet the Base Award requirements
- Contribute \$100 or more annually to a Utah
 Educational Savings Plan during the ages of 14–17

^{*} Award amounts are determined annually and are subject to legislative funding and the total number of qualified participants. Therefore, award amounts may be reduced, may vary from year to year, and are dependent on when the recipient is enrolled in college.
